Right after Thanksgiving break, Drexel SWE had an inspiring Lunch and Learn with Vice Provost for Academic Programs and Strategic Initiatives, Dr. Koren Bedeau! We had an introspective discussion regarding the power of mentorship and ways that we can empower women around us. While we had an even mix of men and women in the audience. We went over the different kinds of results people get and offered this test to our members.

LOCKHEED MARTIN INFORMATION SESSION

On November 13. Drexel SWE hosted a Lockheed Martin Information Session which included testimonials from SWE members as well as a free professional headshots session! Alongside a few Drexel alumni who currently work at Lockheed Martin (LM), Adrienne McAbee, Lockheed Martin Campus Recruiter, gave a presentation about the opportunities available at LM, such as rotational programs and co-op positions. After the presentation, both Nohra Murad, previous SWE Officer and former co-op at Lockheed Martin, and Amanda Weissman, Counselor / Faculty Advisor Coordinator-Elect of SWE and Product Architect at LM, gave testimonials about how their experiences in both SWE and LM go hand-in-hand. The Lockheed Martin team and the SWE members shared multiple stories of success and failure, from being at the missile base in Hawaii at the time of the false missile alert to pursuing the many academic opportunities that LM supports. We hope our 30 attendees were able to learn more about Lockheed Martin!

BECOME A VOLUNTEER WORKSHOP

Our first event of the term was very successful. We partnered with Drexel's Lindy Center for Civic Engagement to host a "Become a Volunteer" workshop. The purpose of this event was to help Drexel students of all years receive their background checks, which allows them to volunteer with us and with other Drexel programs. We had 6 SWE members come and get background checks! The Lindy Center was a great host too as they helped walk our members through the different steps with ease! Overall, it was a great event, and if anyone wants to get background checked - we can help you!

MERCK INTRODUCTION TO ENGINEERING

This event was one of our most exciting events this term. We were lucky enough to collaborate with Merck, a notable pharmaceutical company with offices worldwide. Particularly alongside Merck's Women's Network, we put together a Saturday morning event with four rotations of activities for middle school aged girls. The volunteers from Merck offered a presentation on life at Merck and about various engineering fields, as well an entire activity in the realm of pharmaceuticals. Our other demonstrations dealt with mechanical engineering, where attendees had to acknowledge material and dimension constraints to design a container to hold 300 pieces of popcorn, civil engineering, where attendees had to build a structure out of straws to hold a ball after learning about the best shapes for construction, and electrical engineering, where attendees used Makey Makeys to understand conductivity and how electric current travels. Overall, everyone who attended thoroughly enjoyed the event and learned so much! Special thanks to Merck Women's Network for helping us put together such an amazing event.

SCIENCE AFTER HOURS

Our final event of the term was Science After Hours which was held at the Franklin Institute. This term's theme was based on Harry Potter and the institute was converted into a Wizarding School that highlighted prominent parts of the world famous books and movies. Drexel SWE had a table located opposite the Planetarium on the lower level of the Institute. This year we created Dry Ice Bubbles using dry ice pellets, warm water and dish soap solution. The attendees were actively involved in creating the bubbles and were very responsive when each of our volunteers performed the experiment and explained the science of sublimation as dry ice turns from a solid directly into a gas. We also explained how the rate of reaction changes as we experiment with different water temperatures. Overall, this event was a big success with an excellent outcome in terms of volunteers and attendees.




OUTREACH



ICS ENGINEERING NIGHT FOR GIRLS

We held our Second Annual ICS Engineering Night for Girls at Independence Charter School in Center City Philadelphia. This year, we accommodated over forty girls from grades 6 to 8, many of whom were new to the Engineering Night for Girls program. It was also exciting to see so many new volunteers alongside those who volunteered at this event last year. We started with a brief introduction on what activities we would be showcasing and went right into the demonstrations. The fields on engineering that we focused on this year were chemical engineering, where attendees learned about chromatography by tie-dying pieces of cloth, civil engineering, where attendees learned about the strength of different shapes and were tasked with creating a structure to hold a basket of markers, mechanical engineering, where attendees learned about kinetic and potential energy and worked together to design and construct a roller coaster using pipe insulation, and electrical/materials science engineering, where attendees used Makey Makeys and the Body Light to understand concepts of conductivity and electric current through different materials. The girls who had attended last year were able to show off some of their past knowledge to help newer girls to complete tasks or answer questions! All of the attendees enjoyed the event greatly and so did the volunteers. We can't wait to do it again next year!



NETWORKING



Networking committee started off the new academic year with the pairing of new mentors and mentees for both professional mentorship and undergraduate mentorship programs. Currently we have over 40 members in the professional mentorship program and over 50 members in the undergraduate mentorship program.

PROFESSIONAL MENTORSHIP MEET & GREET

Our first event for the term was a professional mentorship meet & greet. This meet & greet was held at Sky View Hall, where members networked over some refreshments. One professional mentor shared her experiences at Drexel many years ago, while the undergraduate mentees shared their current student life experiences at Drexel. Members went around the table sharing their most valuable networking tip with each other, which opened up discussions. The night ended with an exchange of valuable resources between the members and a discussion of future events.
