SWE recently held the financial panel discussion and overall, it was a great success. Morgan Stanley was there to give an overview of financial planning, and to help answer any financial questions in an open discussion forum. Close to 40 people were in attendance, and there was a very interactive question and answer session! Information packets were also handed out to those interested in learning more about how to positively impact their financial position.

2015 Region H Conference

The 2015 SWE Region H Conference, Bringing the Brains & Beauty to Engineering, was held March 6 – 7 on the beautiful University of Notre Dame campus. This year's conference provided an interactive forum for more than 800 students, engineers, technology and business leaders from industry, academia, and government to network and to develop professionally and personally in an environment conducive to delivering on SWEs three goals: promoting professional excellence by developing women engineers, being a global and inclusive organization promoting diversity and inclusion, and by advocating for the inclusion and success of women. The Region H conference has a long history of being the largest regional conference that SWE hosts annually and the SWE MidMichigan section was well represented this year with 5 attendees from Dow Corning and Dow.

The conference activities began Friday afternoon with a continuing education unit where attendees learned about "How to ask with confidence and receive what you want" that was taught by Nadine Haupt, of FAST Women in Business. Multiple tours were also provided of the Notre Dame Campus and even the amazing Notre Dame Football Stadium where we learned about the Gipper, where they filmed the movie "Rudy", and how to "play like a champion today!" Attendees could also visit the Notre Dame Power Plant, the South Bend Chocolate Factory, and even Honeywell. The Friday evening entertainment included time to relax with mani/pedi's and massages, special showings of Big Hero 6 & Apollo 13, swimming, and all of your favorite childhood board games.

The official conference program began Saturday morning with a strong welcome and State of SWE address delivered by SWE FY15 President Elizabeth Bierman, Sr Project Engineer for Honeywell Aerospace. Elizabeth talked about our efforts making SWE a truly international organization with global presence, improving SWE branding, including a possible new SWE symbol, and our organizations work securing more resources for sections to provide more scholarships and to enhance their impact on our society. Next an enthusiastic key note talk was delivered by Tara Murphy, the Vice President and General Manager for Keurig Green Mountain, Global Brand & Product — Cold Systems, who shared how following her passion lead her from learning how things work, to making things at scale, to connecting brands with consumers, the earning and selling aspects of business, and now, in her current role, how organizations work. Following the morning welcome the collegiate and professional section meetings broke out.

The professional meeting discussed Region H business, notably the conference budget status and elections for 2016, which will occur in early April 2015. Thereafter Lori Tauber Marcus, Chief Product Officer of Keurig Cold Systems, gave a rich and moving talk, challenging the professionals in the audience "to train for the life and career that you deserve". She shared her approach to looking at your work and life path holistically, rather than as separately, and how to trust your gut and choose which direction is best for

you in the moment, always abiding by your true North. She advocated for thinking of ourselves as "corporate athletes" that need to plan-train-refuel in order to deliver the best we can despite the cards we are dealt. The Region H four afternoon professional and personal development sessions

comprised 25 invited oral presentations that endeavored to cover a broad range of topics including leadership, goal making, how to build your professional network, how to own your career, how to influence with persuasion, and how to build a team and make it work. To complement the PD sessions, an impressive 52 companies recruited top talent by participating in the conference Career Fair, which was on-going concurrently for the collegiate members. At the end of the day the conference closing address was delivered by Katie Dommer, Associate Technical Fellow at Aerojet Rocketdyne, who shared her expertise in the in-space liquid rocket propulsion field.

Following the closing address the MidMichigan section (pictured below, from left to right, Rebecca Wells, Elizabeth Stelzer, Rebekah Feist, Nancy Tseng,

Mollie Hesse) enjoyed a delicious dinner at Woochi Japanese Fusion in South Bend. That wraps up another fantastic and enriching SWE Region H conference.

You're on our Email List, but are YOU a Member?

How to become a Member of SWE:

While signing up to be on our email distribution list and attending Mid-Michigan SWE events is great, there is a little more to becoming a SWE member. Don't get us wrong – we welcome anyone to our events, member or not. We are also thrilled to have the opportunity to network and meet other women who may not be members of SWE, and help them find opportunities to volunteer in our communities.

Unfortunately, when we charge for events, we typically need to charge non-SWE members a little more than our rate for members. Why is this? As it turns out, a portion of the fee that you pay to SWE nationals when you sign up to be a member of SWE comes back to the section to help fund events. That's why we can charge members less – a portion of our budget is funded by their memberships!

So, if you want to become a member of SWE, here is what you do:

- 1. Go to swe.org and click on Membership.
- 2. Click on Types and Benefits to see the different kinds of memberships available and other information throughout the page. These include a standard professional membership for \$100 annual fee, joint membership options with other minority organizations, and discounts for recent grads and those who are retired or may be unemployed. (The most common membership type is Professional, and anyone with a degree in engineering or similar field qualifies.)
- 3. After you determine which membership group you fall into, select Join across the top bar or the yellow button that says Join/Renew.
- 4. This will open another window and click on "Become a Member (Non-member)".
- 5. Follow the prompts to create your account.
- 6. Select your membership. There is a one-time processing fee of \$20 for all new members. You can then proceed to the Checkout.
- 7. Processing may take a little time, but you will typically be notified by mail with your membership number, and you will start to receive the occasional email from National SWE.

The most common question we hear is, "Will my company pay for my membership?" In our experience, some companies do, and some do not. We even have seen employees of the same company get different answers depending on their department policies or their boss's discretion. It doesn't hurt to ask, but be prepared that not all employers are funding professional memberships.
